# Food Bank Benefit and Hot Stuff Regatta Set for July 11

Here's a splendid excuse to take a nice drive in the country, enjoy our lush WFSC Club Grounds and help your fellow man - all at the same time!

On July 11, WFSC is hosting a Food Bank Benefit Burger Feed in conjuction with the Club's Hot Stuff Regatta.

The racers will gather at 10 a.m. for a skippers meeting before they head out to race, weather permitting, of course. Any club member can race any boat. It's one big fleet under handicap rules.

There is no entry fee, but you must attend the Skippers Meeting.

Then, starting at about 1:30 p.m., WFSC will start serving deluxe grilled burgers to everybody who brings in a substantial donation to the *Wichita Area Food Bank*. This could be cash, check or a big bag of canned and/or dry-staple food items.

The Food Bank Benefit is going to go on, rain or shine. All the proceeds from this event will go directly to the *Wichita Area Food Bank*.

We will be providing the burgers in individual containers including meat, bun, condiments and other fixings and a bag of chips. That way we can avoid standing around in the usual food line.

We will have some tables scattered around for your use. If you don't want to stay, you can call ahead on your way out to the club and we'll bring your order directly to your car (Steve Colley, 733-0847, or Lee Havins, 704-1474).

This event should continue until about 6 p.m.

In addition to the benefit burger feed, we may have a little informal Hot Rod Car Show in the Pavillion area to add to the entertainment value.

I'm sure many of us already support the Food Bank. It is an excellent organization that has low overhead and provides a lot of service to people in need. Due to the pandemic, the Food Bank hasn't been able to hold many of its usual fundraisers (in the mall, etc). Meanwhile, the demand for its services has greatly increased.

Earlier this year the Club made a donation to the Food Bank, but we wanted to do more. Our goal for this benefit event is \$1000.

We may continue the Food Bank Benefit on Sunday afternoon, July 12. More details on that to come. (Two great Yacht Club burgers in a single weekend - WOW! That's like a dream come true!)

We won't turn anybody away who just happens by, but this event is not advertised to the general public. You can bring your friends. It is designed for WFSC members and their guests.

Put this on your calendar now. Don't miss out on this opportunity to enjoy the Club and help our less fortunate neighbors. Under the current circumstances, there are more now than ever.


Glen's mother, Gaile Spadin, also joined the club and is part-owner of the Flying Scot.

Flying Scot Fleet 170 has completed four races. The scoreboard shows Steve Priester and Lee Havins tied for first, Dave Brunner in third and Glenn Tole fourth.

Each series has attracted a maximum of eight boats.
